# Edmund's Message

This is the first issue of *Network* of 2020 and in a new decade, so A happy New Year to you all!

A new season brings fresh hope, reflecting the rhythm of day and night, in which a good night's sleep restores energy and enthusiasm. That rhythm was reinforced when Sunday was treated as a day of rest giving people space to catch up and regather. It reflects the reality that God is the God of a thousand new beginnings, as every day he is restoring the damage done by evil in the lives of individuals and the community as well in nature itself.

February will bring the challenge of being outside the EU. Getting there has been painful and we long for our hurts and divisions to be healed. But how can that be done? Psalm 121 begins by asking that question, "I lift up my eyes to the hills. Where does my help come from?" Poetically 'the hills' suggests human strength and security. But the writer has a better answer: "My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth." That may seem a pious platitude, but Christian annals abound with stories of people recording the many ways in which God has been faithful to his promise.

God not only promises his protection, he also promises healing. One such promise was given in response to King Solomon's prayer when he dedicated the temple in Jerusalem. God assured the King that he had heard his prayer. When people, who had forgotten him and were in distress, sought his face, humbly acknowledged their errors and resolved to do what is right, God promised: "then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14); here is the sure new beginning that is still on offer.

If we really want to see the wounds and divisions healed in both nation and church, we need to do what God calls us to do, so that he can give us that fresh start as he forgives and heals. That is why our church services begin with confession, reminding us that in his goodness and mercy God is ever willing to give us that new beginning. That praver of confession begins "We have strayed...", showing that it is a corporate prayer that we make not only for ourselves but for our community both as a church and a nation. If at first sight God may not seem to answer our pravers, we should look closer and see how he is at work through the many people who, in so many ways, are restoring the broken and alleviating suffering.

So, as we face the challenges of a new decade, let us do so by looking humbly for God's promised help. May you find the happiness of knowing him as your Heavenly Father.

### The Future of St George's, Beckington

"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope."

Jeremiah 29:11

The New Year is a time to look forward and to plan and at St. George's, we are doing just that. We could have spent the last five years whilst without a Rector marking time or even going into some sort of decline. However, it's been a period of pulling together and resilience. We are trusting that someone will be appointed in the near future but we need to keep attending to the spiritual and physical needs of our community whether we have an incumbent or not.

Various 'physical' problems at St. George's in 2019 have made us stop and take stock. Our aged boiler developed a terminal fault, we've had on-going electrical problems and a section of the churchyard wall collapsed. The last two are straightforward, though not inexpensive, to rectify. The first, the boiler, is not going to be easy to solve but tackling the problem can be seen as an opportunity to re-shape the future of the church, materially and spiritually. As we are going to have to replace our current heating arrangements with something modern, efficient and environmentally sustainable, what else can we achieve to maximise the benefit that will eventually result from the inevitable disruption and expense? If the boiler is re-sited, what do we do with the ancient boiler house? Do we

take this opportunity to put in much needed facilities such as a toilet and a kitchenette in there or in the church itself? How can we make the building more user- friendly, more welcoming and more useful to our surrounding communities without spoiling its beauty? St. George's has changed significantly over the centuries, as anyone who has read Michael McGarvie's excellent history will know.

We are going to have a number of challenges and will have to draw up a 2, 5 or even 10 year plan. The biggest obstacle will be the expense. A new heating system will cost between £20000 and £30000. The Church of England is funded from the bottom up. not the top down, and our weekly running costs, excluding repairs and purchases, are around £1000 per week. (That is not a misprint!) We shall need to fundraise, apply for grants, get planning permissions from both Mendip and the diocese etc. We shall need people with energy, vision. time and expertise.

You may not be a regular at St. George's or any other church but you may well still love the building and feel proud that we have such a beautiful church in our midst. We are on a mission in more ways than one so if you have time or expertise that you can offer us, do get in touch. In the meantime, we shall publish updates on any developments.

# All Saints Rodden



Our Church at Rodden has lost a most devoted member with the passing of June Beck, wife of Jim, long-serving churchwarden. June carried no

title apart from PCC member, but her work for the church and its family was immense, indeed never-ending. Much was not recognised, of course, because that was June's way; only now will such sincerity be so apparent.

Born in Weymouth in 1935, she met Jim as a 13-year-old teenager. Walking the Esplanade with friends, her group met Jim with his friends. As was said in the eulogy, "This was the start of what turned out to be a long and loving relationship that lasted 71 years – 66 of them married."

Jim and June had two children, Anne and Jill, and with their children June became "the Matriarch of the family", instilling her high morals into all the children. When visiting Jim and June's home, one could see how the children and grandchildren were the centre of her life.

Both became very involved with Rodden Church when they moved to Frome in 1971. June worked hard to help All Saints' and its congregation, ready to tackle any task, be it flower arranging, catering and raising money, above all many hundreds of pounds with the annual Christmas/Harvest draw. Behind the scenes June did so much to support Jim as churchwarden, spending many hours "finding" organists, and arranging hymns for services. This was a major task during her last years, due to her health. Thank you, June, from all of us.

## Rode & District Gardening Club

For the start of the New Year we welcomed the return of David Moon to give us an audio-visual presentation about the Royal Horticultural Society.

The Society holds 6 major Garden Shows around the country, Chelsea being the most well-known but now joined by Hampton Court, Malvern, Chatsworth, Tatton Park and Cardiff.

The Society, with the help of many volunteers, now organises the Britain in Bloom competition where cities, towns and villages compete for "Best in Bloom" awards. This also links with community and neighbourhood groups working to use derelict land. 'green' small areas and grow vegetables and garden in a sustainable way. There are 4 major gardens run by the Society. The first, founded in 1903 is at Wislev in Surrev where there are extensive trial grounds and every sort of garden, all kept immaculate by students and gardeners. They have an enormous Glasshouse which has 3 climatic zones to display plants from different parts of the world. There is an extensive re-vamp underway at the moment and we can look forward to much improved facilities as well as some modern developments. Rosemoor in North Devon was given to the Society by Lady Anne Palmer and has a spectacular vegetable garden and wonderful displays of spring bulbs and shrubs. Hvde Hall in Essex specialises in drought tolerant plants displayed in a dry garden and has planted 60,000 trees to make a Wild Wood, The Yorkshire Botanic

Garden became Harlow Carr in 2001 and is famous for its candelabra primulas and meconopsis blue poppies in early summer, displayed along the longest stream-side garden in Britain. The Society is in the process of planting a new garden, Bridgewater in Salford which is due to open this summer.

David also showed us some examples of gardens closer to home. Kilver Court in Shepton Mallet where a rock garden was bought from the Chelsea Flower Show and transported to Somerset to become a spectacular part of the garden under the viaduct. The organic garden at Holt Farm near Blagdon Lake, run by Yeo Valley, has a variety of meadows, herbaceous borders and vegetables. Knoll Gardens in Dorset specialise in grasses and demonstrates the versatility of these plants. David was thanked for another lovely presentation.

Next month we will welcome Christine Brain to talk about Wall Shrubs and Climbers. Monday 10<sup>th</sup> February at 7.30pm in Rode Village Hall.

# Rodden Church History – Then & Now

Rodden Church has a history which can be traced back to the 13<sup>th</sup> Century. In January it added a new page when the Rev Clarissa Shaw-Notice accepted an invitation to lead the Celebration of Holy Communion. Undoubtedly the first Church of England woman priest to do so at All Saints. Thirty nine men and women gave her a warm, effusive, welcome – more than double the size of congregation she was expecting on a dark winter's evening, at a church in the middle of a farm!

The Rev Clarissa, as she is known, is curate at Holy Trinity Church in Frome, having trained with the vicar and Area Dean, the Rev Graham Owen. She is soon to leave to become vicar of her own church or churches.

When she came to visit All Saints, in preparation, and saw and felt its special feel, she said its country setting reminded her of her native Jamaica, where she grew up as a child.

Clarissa handled the traditional 1662 style of service well, with her sermon brief, pertinent and precise – no words wasted. Always appreciated at Rodden.

The task of the evening for the wardens was persuading the congregation it was time to go home as they stayed to chat with their history-making woman priest, who, by the way, did not know of that importance until told afterwards!

# Somerset Council News

For more than two years the Leaders and Chief Executives of all Somerset's five local authorities have been discussing the future shape of local government in the county.

An independent report, produced for all Somerset's councils, is published here: <u>https://onesomerset.org.uk/</u> setting out the pros, cons and possibilities of different options – ranging from the councils working closer together to the creation of a single 'Unitary' Authority. All the options have merit and each has the potential to save millions.

All Councils working more closely together could achieve a predicted saving of £10m-£32m, creating a single Unitary Authority – a predicted saving of £35m-47m The Leader of Somerset County Council, Councillor David Fothergill, has underlined his view that a single, Unitary Authority for Somerset is the best way forward. It would reduce duplication and inefficiencies and see resources pooled, meaning more money for frontline services like schools, transport and climate change initiatives, housing and social care.

Happy 2020 to you all,

The end of the 2019 saw the year 3 and 4 children visit Stourhead and this included some Narnia themed activities and a guided tour of the house. The children were in awe and wonder during their walk around, they enjoyed a hot chocolate at the end to warm up cold hands. The children took pleasure in celebrating our learning for the term. We also celebrated everyone's talents and achievements which have taken place outside of school. It can be hard to perform in front of an audience. especially when you have only just starting learning something new like an instrument or a dance. Back at school our younger children have been using the outdoor classroom as well as making winter decorations to hang in the playground. # The New Mendip District Council Local Plan.

Mendip District Council (MDC) has been told by The Planning Inspectorate that its Local Plan needs to include plans to build more houses - 505 to be precise - the response by MDC appears to be to target the North-East of the district, as in Beckington and our neighbouring parishes of Rode, Norton St Philip, Chilcompton and Kilmersdon, Joint meetings of all five Parish Councils have taken place and the engagement of a Planning Barrister is being seriously considered, as there is strong feeling that many of the Parishes in this area of Mendip have taken enough development for now. The cost of engaging a barrister would be shared across a few of the Parish Councils. As always, the Parish Council would be keen to hear your view on this, do you think the village should have some more development as there is plenty of space around the village and to keep it growing is a good thing? Or would you support the Parish Council spending money on legal advice in an attempt to prevent or reduce the amount of further homes being built. Do email or attend the next Parish Council meeting and let us know.


