Beckington Astronomical Society (BAS)

I have noticed over the past few days (17-19th April) what lovely clear nights we have had and the lovely Moon high in the sky. In mid-May the Moon will again be high in the sky and at 1st 1/4. This is ideal for seeing surface detail particularly at the terminator as the shadows cast by the Sun show off the craters. Viewing through binoculars or a telescope will be particularly rewarding. Try taking a picture with a camera. Gone are the days when film was used and one needed to judiciously choose camera settings to get reasonable results without it being expensive in film and processing costs. Nowadays one can take numerous shots using various camera settings. The Moon is very bright and people are often surprised at how short an exposure is required. Ideally mount the camera on a tripod and use the time delay to minimise any vibration. If you have a telescope, try holding the camera against the eyepiece. You many need to adjust the focus. The image shown here is one taken

through my 10-inch Newtonian telescope a few years ago.

Remembering an outstanding astronomer

It was 150 years ago, on 11th May 1871, that John Herschel – British astronomer, mathematician, chemist and pioneering photographer – died at the age of 79. Among other things, he named seven of Saturn's moons and four moons of Uranus, as well as investigating colour blindness. He was also President of the Royal Astronomical Society three times.

He was the son of Sir William Herschel, a distinguished scientist who had moved from Germany to Britain and later discovered the planet Uranus, thus creating a pronunciation problem that still hasn't gone away.

Sir John Herschel, himself knighted in 1831, made many contributions to the science of photography and invented the blueprint. He was also deeply interested in the philosophy of science and pioneered an inductive approach to experiments and the construction of scientific theories.

Between 1834 and 1838 he worked in South Africa with his wife Margaret, studying and photographing Cape flora as well as continuing his astronomical interests. It was here that he met Charles Darwin, on his way home in the HMS Beagle, and had a significant influence on him. Sir John also developed and backed the use of the impressive Julian day numbering system in astronomy.

easily but one positive legacy of the year was the creation of the Beckington Allotment

Association. So, we thought it was about time



we introduced ourselves.

t's just over a year since we were each allocated our little 'patch of potential' on a field behind the David Wilson development - that's a polite way of saying that the site was overgrown and partly underwater. So, having briefly considered the commercial viability of starting the Beckington paddy fields, we set to work. Armed with spades, forks and a wheelbarrow-full of enthusiasm, we went forth to do battle with the mud.

Work commenced at an impressive ratetonnes of manure were shifted, hedges were hacked and sheds seemed to spontaneously multiply overnight. We only encountered a couple of initial mishaps, including one of our members (who shall remain anonymous) becoming so stuck in the quagmire that they only managed to free themselves by clambering onto a nearby plank of wood serving as a life raft. We happily avoided a search and rescue call out on this occasion but his left welly boot is still missing in action!

To our relief, Summer came early last year which meant the mud was soon replaced with baked-dry earth, presenting its own challenges. But the warm, sunny days meant an early crop of produce and it wasn't long before we were hunting for the buried golden nuggets of first early potatoes, inhaling the sweet, earthy scent of freshly-pulled carrot and discussing 101 things to do with courgette!

I wish you a joyful May

When Van Gogh painted 'The Raising of Lazarus', he turned to Rembrandt for inspiration. But in place of the figure of Jesus, he painted a warm, glowing sun, radiant in the sky, and shining out to bring renewal of life to Lazarus and his sisters.

From time immemorial people have placed the sun at the centre of life and worship. As Christianity grew and spread, it took over ceremonies and practices associated with that belief, but then moved the focus from the sun above to the Son, Jesus, on the earth below.

We can see that in the traditions and worship of Christmas and Easter. In May we celebrate the goodness and (May Morning on Magdalen Tower' by Holman Hunt)

fruitfulness of nature brought by the sun with Maypole dancing, the crowning of the May Queen, and games and sports, just as the Romans went dancing in the fields at this time, rejoicing in the gifts of Flora, the goddess of nature. In May the druids would greet the sun in the sky as they gathered on a high place.

That custom persisted for several centuries, particularly at Magdalen College in Oxford. In 1840 Dr John Bloxam revived the ceremony. Holman Hunt, one of that group of artists known as the Pre-Raphaelites, visited Oxford in 1851 and so enjoyed the Christmas festivities that he decided to honour the college life in one of his

paintings. That decision took many years to reach the canvas: his painting of 'May Morning on Magdalen Tower' is one of his last complete works in 1890.

We can easily identify the choristers gathered to greet the rising sun in music and song. Amid the clouds and blue sky above, the birds are flying and the floor where the choir stand is bedecked with flowers. It is a glorious celebration of the fruitfulness of May and the summer: God's creation bringing so many gifts. The president of the college is the man with the dark beard at the right of the painting, and Dr Bloxam is beside him. But there is an unusual character there also, at the side of the painting a Parsee, an ancient worshipper of the sun from Persia, perhaps representing not just those who look to the light of the sun, but are also searching for the light of truth. The young chorister in the middle looking out at us holds a lilv. the symbol of Marv, the mother of God's Son.

All creation is gathered to greet the dawn and the rising sun of May – the birds above and people below, young and old, Christian and non-Christian - all united to proclaim the goodness and renewal promised by the sun.

Holman Hunt said that he wanted to represent 'the spirit of a beautiful, primitive and in a large sense eternal service.' Here is a vivid reminder that the faith we profess opens our eyes to God's goodness and glory symbolised in the rising sun, and that He welcomes everyone to share in those gifts.

NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR SOMERSET BUSES

The UK Government has just launched a new national bus strategy for England entitled Bus Back Better. The government believes "buses are the easiest. cheapest and quickest way to improve transport". This national Bus Strategy is backed by £3 billion of new funding and forms a key plank in the government's twin agenda of "Levelling Up" and "ensuring the economy meets Net Zero carbon emissions". This is the biggest change in buses in the last 30 years! Said Peter Travis, Co-Chair of Somerset Bus Partnership and a Chair of Frome and Villages Bus User Group, "This new national bus strategy and its extra funding gives us in Somerset the chance to deliver major improvements in the County's bus services. Somerset now needs to seize this unique opportunity."

The newly formed Somerset Bus Partnership is supported both by councilors and by bus user groups across Somerset and it will seek to work with local town and parish councils and with Somerset County Council to input into a Bus Enhancement Partnership for Somerset that incorporates both what current bus users need and take steps to facilitate more Somerset residents to switch from using private cars to travel by bus.


At 10 journeys per resident, Somerset currently has the fourth lowest bus passenger journeys per population in England. It is the lowest in the South West, Bus passenger journeys in Somerset have decreased by more than some 40% over the past decade.



Ascension Day 13th May

40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to His disciples, following His death and resurrection. Matthew 28: Mark 16: Luke 24: and John 20. The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those 40 days. Jesus was seen by numerous of His disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged His disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had

had sent Him, He was now going to send them – to all corners of the earth, as His witnesses. Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the

story with great poignancy:

promised about the Messiah, Jesus

also told them that as the Father

'When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, He lifted up His hands – and blessed them'

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with His return to His Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless His disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with

love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus:

'While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:50-1)

He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day:

'I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...' (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on:

'they worshipped Him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God."
(Luke24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! 'I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.

Day of Pentecost Whit Sunday 23rd May

Pentecost took place on the wellestablished Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was seven weeks after Easter, or 50 days including Easter.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit – the day the Church was born.

Jesus had told His disciples that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for His disciples, but He knew they could not do the work themselves. They would need His help.

And so, they waited in Jerusalem, praying together with His other followers, for many days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues, to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1- 9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the disciples and followers of

Jesus. The Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning, proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course, Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, He could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of His Holy Spirit.

Trinity Sunday 30th May Celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it. and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example: Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.

This month Network has been speaking with **Jane Kellett** from Beckington who shares her story of faith, life and love.

Being born in Perranporth with the surname 'Trevenna' I am proud of my Cornish roots! I had a lovely childhood, later leaving home to train as a nurse in Exeter & midwife in Oxford. After working as a night sister in the Radcliffe, I moved to Bristol as a sister at Southmead hospital. Going to church I met Tim, a geologist, training for Anglican ministry at Trinity College. We got engaged after 6 weeks, married within 6 months & had 30 years of happy marriage.

I trained to teach nurses at UWE before we moved to Hertfordshire. Tim was a curate & I taught at a hospital in Stevenage. To our delight, after 3 miscarriages our daughter Rebecca was born, followed 2 yrs later by David, by which time we had moved to a small mining village in Warwickshire where Tim was vicar.

In 1985 we moved to the Lizard peninsula in Cornwall - St Keverne spending 10 happy years there. Then Tim was asked to direct training for the diocese so we moved nearer Truro, where he also had care of 3 small rural churches. During this time both children left to go to university & I worked for NHS Direct as a Nurse Advisor.

Before coming to Beckington where Tim was appointed Rector, we moved to Norwich, where I worked

in diabetes research, later teaching nurses & medical students advanced skills. Tim was chaplain to Norwich university UEA & assisted at Norwich cathedral, but missed working in a parish so we moved here in 2005.

This was to have been our last appointment before retiring to Cornwall, but as some of you realise, it was not to be - Tim collapsed while running in Nov 06 & was taken to the RUH deeply unconscious, dying 10 days later without regaining consciousness.

Life was very hard but many friends supported me. I had to move from the Rectory & bought a house in the village. I was working as sister of a Stroke Rehabilitation Unit at Shepton Mallet, so continued there until retirement & now have been volunteering as a Samaritan for 10 yrs. I love singing & joined a choir in every place we lived.

I was blessed to find love again; I met Andrew, a Baptist Minister. We married in 2013 & now have a blended family- 4 children, 2 grandsons, with another babe on the way!

Throughout my life from childhood my Christian faith has helped me through good & hard times. I know there is a loving, caring God who just wants to make himself known to each of us.






