### A Reflection

#### Dear Friends

I'm going to share with you a few words from one of the songs found in the Bible. From Psalm 104. It is a song about creation and about the rhythm found in the seasons and our working day. I was chatting to one of our local farmers in the first half of June and hearing of his relief to have the dry days before cutting grass for silage after the very wet May we endured.

- <sup>21</sup> The lions roar while they hunt. All their food comes from God.
- <sup>22</sup> The sun rises, and they slip away. They return to their dens and lie down.
- <sup>23</sup> Then people get up and go to work. They keep working until evening.

We don't have lions in our villages, well not unless Longleat suddenly develops a significant problem! But we are surrounded by wildlife. I'm still surprised by the variety of bird song I hear. During the day I'm blessed with the sound of children from the two ends of Church Street in Beckington. The sounds of the rhythm of growth and nurture. And that isn't a typo.... I really do mean nurture.

Many have talked of slowing down during the covid lockdowns. Spending more time in our gardens, if we are fortunate to have one, or out walking in nature. People have talked about changed priorities. Life is once again getting busy and there is considerable relief in the activity and being able to meet up and spend time with family and friends.

As a person of faith, I value moments of daily prayer and periods of spiritual retreat. It helps me consider my priorities and to find a rhythm that feeds me at our deeper level.

During these summer months, I shall value moments to pause and sit and to enjoy the amazing gift of God's creation. And I am especially looking forward to singing God's Praise at the Open Air Service on the 18<sup>th</sup> July.



## **Beckington Family Practice**

We would like to thank all of our patients for your patience and your expressions of support during the pandemic so far.

Although it is not currently possible to directly book a face-to-face appointment with a GP, we have continued to provide face-to-face. telephone and online support and our nursing team have been working hard to provide essential care and investigations. We are also performing large numbers of blood tests on behalf of the local hospitals. Thank you for being patient. We're very busy, with many people contacting the surgery for medical advice and treatment. We are doing all we can to answer your queries as quickly as we can - this may take longer than usual.

Now that lockdown is lifting, our GP practices are experiencing very high numbers of patients trying to contact them. In response we have been providing almost 20% more consultations than two years ago but this is proving very challenging. Please be patient and understanding if it takes a while for us to answer the phone or for you to be seen for an appointment. Don't forget your highly qualified. local community pharmacist can provide health advice and over the counter products or help with a wider range of minor illnesses and injuries like backache, bites, coughs and colds, sunburn, hay fever and diarrhoea. For urgent care, or after our GP surgery has closed, call or click NHS 111 to be directed to the local healthcare you need.

With new variants circulating, only half of the adult population fully vaccinated, some very vulnerable patients, and with scientific advice to minimise numbers indoors (including waiting rooms) and limit face to face contact time, we cannot safely return to 'service as normal' yet.

While face-to-face appointments continue to be offered to those based on clinical need, many issues can be resolved during a phone consultation without patients having to travel to a surgery. The practice team will direct you to the most appropriate healthcare team for your needs. We can also conduct video consultations and receive images by text or email, if the GP requests this. We are certainly not 'phone only', as some have feared, but we are likely to be 'phone first' for the time being.

# **Beckington Astronomical Society (BAS)**

Warm summer nights are an invitation to look at the night sky and this can lead to buying a telescope. Sadly, there are many telescopes up and down the country that are never used because they were bought on impulse. I thought for this Network, I would say a little about binoculars and telescopes that might be helpful if you are thinking of making a purchase.

First a few words about binoculars. Don't underestimate their value to amateur astronomers. They are easy to use and transport, and Patrick Moore was a strong advocate of them. Keep an eye out at car boot sales as one can get a real bargain! If they look tatty, they have probably been used a lot because they are good. The binoculars will be marked with two numbers e.g., 10X50. There first figure gives the magnification and the second figure the diameter of the large lens in millimetres. The larger the big lens the more light gathering capability and fainter objects will be able to be seen. The example I have given is a popular choice. I was fortunate at an Astronomy Star party to look through some very large binoculars. The view of the Milky Way was the most impressive I have seen (except for with the naked eye in British Colombia National Park). A quick word on setting the focus. One of the evepieces will have its own individual focus control. Shut the eye against that eyepiece and adjust the main focus using the

other eye. Then without touching the main focus adjust the 'individual' eyepiece for that eye (the one you had closed earlier). Having done this, you should only need to use the main focus when looking at different objects.

Turning to telescopes. There are two basic types Refractors and reflectors (and numerous combinations particularly for the specialists). A refractor only uses lenses and is what most people think of as a telescope - like Admiral Nelson used. A reflecting telescope uses a mirror to gather the light which is fed through an eyepiece to the eye. Newton was famous for this design hence they are often called Newtonian telescopes. Something that can be strange to the newcomer is the evepiece is on the side of the Newtonian telescope. For both telescopes the larger the main lens or mirror the greater the light gathering capability but it is no good having a large mirror/lens if it is of poor quality. Something often missed is the importance of a good mount for the telescope. There are two basic types Alt/Azimuth and Equatorial. The Altitude/Azimuth is like a gun mounting. The telescope can swing round in a horizontal plane and up and down in a vertical plain. To track an object in the sky, adjustments are necessary in both planes to offset the rotation of the Earth.

The Equatorial mount has one of its axes parallel to the Earth's axis and it is only necessary to adjust one axis to compensate for the

Earth's rotation. Any mount needs to be firm and steady without vibration. I should mention something to look at late on a July/August night. Looking South, the 'summer triangle' is easy to find made up of the stars, Deneb, Vega & Altair.

Before buying a telescope think about how you will use it. Where will vou use it and store it. How long will it take you to set it up? What do you want to view? (Planets, Constellations. Galaxies. photography). The best thing is to talk to some amateur astronomers. and if possible, look through different types before making a purchase. Hopefully our society meetings will be starting again in September and we will be very pleased to see new members (and of course our existing members). If you have a question about buying a telescope, give me a ring and I'm sure I or one of our society members will be able to help you.

No special qualification is required to be a councillor; indeed, it is important that all sorts of people serve as councillors to give good representation of the community. Training for new councillors is also available to help assist with understanding the responsibilities of the role.

If you would like to put yourself forward as a Beckington Parish Councillor please either get in touch with the Clerk

(beckingtonparishcouncil@outlook.c om) or come along to the next meeting of the Parish Council to introduce yourself (outside). If more people indicate their interest in becoming a Parish Councillor than the number of vacancies available, candidates will be asked to give a short verbal or written statement about why they are interested in the role, and the Parish Council will make their decision by a majority vote.

#### What do Parish Councillors do?

Beckington Parish Council is made up of 7 voluntary councillors, who meet once a month to discuss and act on issues of importance to the local community. The Parish Council sets and monitors how a proportion of local taxes are spent in the Parish, make comment on planning applications in the Parish and consider projects to help maintain, improve, or enhance the local area.

Local Government is changing, and Parish Councils are seeing an increase in the responsibilities and opportunities to influence decisions made that affect our local community.

## Parish Council Awarded Environment Grant:

The Parish Council has been awarded £6,000 from Somerset County Council's Climate Emergency Community Fund. SCC had made £1m available to Town and Parish Councils across Somerset for projects that would have a positive impact on the environment.

The Beckington bid centred around improving cycling links between the Village centre and Rudge, Rode and Frome. The awarded grant must be used towards commissioning a Local Cycling & Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP). Frome Town Council have already commissioned a LCWIP and many of the surrounding Villages are starting to look at doing the same, so it will be important to ensure they fit in with each other's.

Many thanks to Cllr Paula Fox who put in the hours filling in pages and pages of grant application forms – Great result!

## People in the Parish

This month Network has been speaking with **Andrew Kellett....**My life had been very varied before I came to Beckington about 8 years ago:

- 10 years in farming and agricultural research, mainly in Cambridgeshire
- 20 years as the minister of an inner-city Baptist Church in Bristol
- 10 years as a Chaplain/Manager in the Bristol Salvation Army Hostel.

I was born and brought up in the suburbs of Preston, Lancashire. After studying agriculture and working on a variety of farms I got a job with the Ministry of Agriculture doing practical research on soils and field drainage-this was in the 1970s when farmers were still getting grants to drain their land. While studying agriculture, I discovered God in a new and refreshing way and so on moving to Cambridgeshire I got stuck into the work of the local village Baptist Church, including helping to lead the youth group and the newly formed Boys Brigade. Eventually I felt God calling me to full time Christian ministry. I trained in London and then became the minister (Pastor) of the church in St Pauls in Bristol: about half the congregation were black Afro-Carribean, mainly with Jamaican connections, and half, white English. The fervent prayer

and care of the black members was wonderful.

Sadly, after 15 years my marriage broke down and I had the responsibility for the upbringing of my two children who were then both at primary school. I could only work part time so I got a job at the Salvation Army Hostel supporting the men to get their lives back on track. This included work in the detox and rehab units. Later I was also a voluntary Chaplain at Bristol Prison. Altogether it was a very difficult time which I survived only with God's help. My two children also survived well and both are now hospital pharmacists! Learning from this time. I'm now one of the team of facilitators for the Bristol based Aquila divorce recovery self-help courses.

I live in Beckington now, because 10 years ago I met the lovely Jane and we married in June 2013. We still have some links with Bristol-I've managed to keep my allotment there growing! Church-wise, I'm involved with both CofE and Baptist churches, preaching occasionally at St George's and in village chapels like Rode as well as here in Beckington. I'm also supporting Frome Baptist while they don't have a minister.

It's been lovely coming back to village life and agriculture. During the pandemic we've really enjoyed walking. By the end of May we had clocked up 1,400 miles and have just had to have our walking shoes re-heeled!

## **July Village Agent News**

As Village Agents, we enjoy being able to respond to people's situation quickly and efficiently – we pride ourselves on being problem solving solution finders!

This can be from a seemingly simple task of finding someone a gardener to help reclaim an unruly garden that was causing a mental and physical distress, to being able to provide someone escaping domestic abuse the basics they need to start up a new home and keep them safe.

To do this we rely heavily on our Crisis Fund – an unrestricted pot of funds we manage that we can use to purchase things for people in need. People in crisis.

The Crisis Fund has proved to be an enormously valuable and valued extra "tool in the bag" for Village Agents to help people facing personal and family crises. We haven't ever actively fundraised for the Crisis Fund before, as the donations we had kept us ticking over, but our team has tripled in size in 3 years in response to unprecedented demand for our services, and as a result we are meeting more and more people in need. The past year has been our most challenging yet, and this time of crisis and hardship for many in our communities the need is greater than ever, and we desperately need donations towards the fund which has been almost depleted.

So, this month, it is a plea for the #LoveSomerset Crisis Fund. To help people in Somerset get out of crisis, quickly and with dignity -

## **Olympic Gold**

This month should see the start of the Tokyo Olympics, having been postponed from last year due to the Coronavirus pandemic. A number of New Testament letters refer to Olympic sport including Hebrews:

'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' Hebrews 12:1-2

The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race, but despite the struggles and obstacles, there is a great crowd of witnesses cheering us on. We have a heavenly Father who loves us and a Saviour who has run the race before us. If we keep our eves fixed on Jesus. He will enable us to finish the race. During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the semifinals of the 400 metres. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore. He fell to the ground in pain and stretcher bearers came over to him. However. Redmond was determined to finish the race and so he started hopping toward the finishina line. Suddenly Jim Redmond. Derek's father, ran out of the stands towards him. "You don't have to do this." he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek, to which his father said, "We're going to finish this together." They completed the lap with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder. As they crossed

the finish line, the spectators rose to give Derek a standing ovation.

Although he didn't win an Olympic medal, Derek Redmond finished the race with his father at his side.

Let's not forget the encouragement we have to finish the race.

## St Swithun 15th July

St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15<sup>th</sup> July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly, everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral.

His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the Middle Ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

## William Wilberforce, Olaudah Equiano & Thomas Clarkson 30<sup>th</sup> July

During the 18<sup>th</sup> century many people in England were involved in the campaign to abolish the slave trade. The CofE remembers especially William Wilberforce, Olaudah Equiano and Thomas Clarkson – three very different but all tireless campaigners against the evil practice.

Thomas Clarkson (1760-1846) was an Anglican clergyman and one of the most prominent of the antislavery campaigners. In 1787 he helped form the first Abolitionist Committee, and his energy and hatred of injustice made him a 'moral steam-engine'. He travelled hundreds of miles, gathering evidence from people caught up in the slave trade, from ships' captains to doctors.

Olaudah Equiano (1745 – 1797) had been kidnapped in Nigeria, sold into slavery and sent to the West Indies. When he finally escaped, he made his way to London and became one of the most prominent black campaigners. His brutal autobiography of 1789 ran to nine reprints, and was translated into many languages, bringing home to people the horrors of the slave trade.

William Wilberforce (1759 – 1833), of course, became the main figurehead in Parliament. He came from a wealthy family in Kingston-upon-Hull, and represented the town in Parliament. He was recruited by Thomas Clarkson, who saw the need for a brilliant advocate within Parliament. Wilberforce was an inspired choice: not only wealthy and well- connected, but a gifted orator with a social conscience, especially after his conversion in 1785.

He made his first speech in Parliament against slavery in 1789, but it was not until 1807, after a debate that raged for many years, that the Abolition Act was finally passed.


