

I am very pleased to say that after the last difficult 16 months, the society is now able to hold meetings again. Our next meeting will be on Friday 17th September at the **Beckington Baptist Church Hall** starting at 7.30pm (About 50 yds. from Woolpack off the Frome road see website). For those not familiar with the society, we usually have a talk on the current night sky followed by one or two short talks finishing about 9.30pm with Tea/coffee/biscuits. In the past we have often had a visiting speaker but I'm sure readers will understand that with the recent covid problems that may take a little while to

Membership for the year (10 meetings; no meetings July/August) is £15 (£1.50 a meeting - not bad?!) and £20 for family membership. £3.00 for a single meeting. Those paid-up members will have credit for the 4 meetings not held last year. The aim of the society is for members to enjoy learning more about this fascinating subject. There are no tests or exams. Your increasing knowledge of the night sky will enable you to put in perspective some of the hyped-up rubbish that appears in print. I have just read in a newspaper 'A rare chance to see Jupiter as a 'bright star' in the night sky this Thursday' (19th August). It may technically be its brightest that day but it will still be bright for several weeks. In fact, Jupiter will always be somewhere in the sky every 24 hours and not

difficult to see if it is during the hours of darkness. Some newspapers got verv excited when the comet Shoemaker Levy was due to hit into Jupiter. The end of the world was predicted by some. It was a very interesting event and amateur astronomers were able to see, through their telescopes, the marks made on Jupiter by the comet's impact.

If you are thinking about buying a telescope, it is well worth learning the pros & cons about different telescopes, and where better to do this than by talking to other amateur astronomers who can tell you about their good and bad purchase decisions. However, you definitely do not need a telescope to enjoy astronomy. Most amateur astronomers will say the best view of the Milky Way is with the naked eve.

At this meeting (as at all meetings), we want to hear what topics you would like to see included in future meetings.

What is a Village Agent?

The Village Agent service is part of the Community Council for Somerset (CCS) and offers free, confidential, practical support to **anyone** in need, including community groups. We have unrivalled local knowledge, and are problem solving solution finders!

I'm **Nic**, the Village Agent for the Beckington area - I love the challenge of making a positive impact in our local community for people who need it most. It is very rewarding when a plan comes together, and a person's life is enhanced by the work I have done. I also love to chat! If needed, I work closely with your local GP surgery and the Adult Social Care team, so you have well rounded support.

Sounds Interesting but WHO can a Village Agent help?

A Village Agent can help if....

- You are an unpaid Carer or looking after someone else informally & need a little help & support – for you and the person you care for.
- You are struggling with a problem that can be fixed or improved by accessing the right people or services in the local community, but don't know where to turn.

- You live alone and are feeling lonely and isolated.
- You are part of a community with a collective problem & need a kick start to solve.

It doesn't matter how big or small the problem, we are here to help.

OK that's great – but HOW exactly can a Village Agent help?

It's probably easier to list the things Agents CAN'T do!

We don't like to pin down exactly how an Agent can help, as each person's situation is unique, but generally to make someone's everyday life better with the right connections, access to food, emergency funding or practical community-based solutions. A few recent examples are:

- Supported clients to access transport so that they can attend their vaccination appointments.
- Delivered food to families and individuals who are shielding or isolating & set up an arrangement with the local food bank to supply food to clients.
- Source & arrange delivery of white goods, furniture & household items to people in need.

- Made sure that the clients are supported to get the financial help they need.
- Arranged translations for clients who don't speak fluent English but need our support.
- Supported people who need help collecting prescriptions.
- Conducted welfare calls on behalf of local GPs to ensure clients are safe and well.
- Gave emotional support to people who are feeling isolated and lonely.
- Supported people & particularly unpaid carers by brokering a micro provider who can help with daily living tasks to alleviate some pressure & provided respite meals for Carers.
- Supported elderly Somerset residents to 'survive winter' by making sure that they have sufficient heating and cooking facilities. Distribute Surviving Winter grants.
- Gifted refurbished mobiles to people who are cut off from their family & friends.
- Helped people to get home from hospital or temporary accommodation.

- Helping people to stay
 independent in their homes.
- Found & made connections between clients & the right community-based support.



How wonderful creation is

There is a story that someone asked a Father of the early church,

Tertullian, to prove the existence of God.

He replied by showing the person a rose. But Tertullian took a risk, for while many appreciate the beauty and wonder of a rose, it is not everyone who sees that beauty pointing to God as its creator.

In one of his hymns, Fr Faber wrote:

'How wonderful creation is, the work which thou didst bless, And O! what

'A Hill Prayer' by Maxfield Parrish

then must Thou be like – Eternal loveliness.'

A rose can speak of beauty and speak of God to some; to others a rose is just another flower in the garden. William Blake wrote, 'The tree which moves some to tears of joy is in the eyes of others only a green thing which stands in the way.' We know that only too well when forests are cut down in the name of progress, and trees that have stood for centuries are hewn down in a moment. This month's work of art is 'A Hill Prayer' by Maxfield Parrish: it shows a man standing in a forest of venerable and imposing trees, and the hills stretching out behind him. Maxfield Parrish was an American artist, who created paintings of brilliant colour and luminosity. The particular cobalt he used was known as 'Parrish blue.' Much of his work was for illustrations in books and magazines and in advertising. But here is an early drawing of 1897, based in a New England Forest, that has a haunting quality about it.

He drew it to accompany a poem of Marian Warner Wildman where the writer goes into the forest to escape the doubts and worries of the world and to find release and peace. It ends with the lines:

'I love thee with a beauty-broken heart

And worship thee, be whatever thou art.'

The drawing may evoke for us memories of forests and countryside we have explored, with trees towering above us, reaching to the sky, their leaves rustling in the wind and letting shafts of sunlight through. Like the artist, we may have wondered at their age and beauty and pondered the mystery of creation around us. In their beauty we can alimpse their Creator: in the miracle of their life, we can see the bringer of life and eternal life. For scripture begins with trees: the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil with the story of how human pride exchanges paradise for hard work and toil.

But the final pages of the Bible describe that tree of life once again: this time arching over the river that runs through the heavenly city with leaves that bring healing and restoration. And bridging that tree of Genesis and the tree of Revelation is the wood of the cross: 'None in foliage, none in blossom, none in fruit thy peer may be.' In that tree we can truly glory.

Autumn will soon be with us, and the magnificence of the trees around will fade as their leaves fall and are swept away. After the death of winter, spring will come and bring the miracle of new life to their roots and branches, and once again we can behold their glory, like the traveller in the forest of Maxfield Parrish's drawing – trees that remind us of 'the one and only noble tree': the Cross that is the sign of salvation for all seasons and all lives.

Becoming new

When a caterpillar changes into a butterfly, it's hard to believe it's the same creature. But at both stages of its life, it has a body that is perfectly suited to living in a particular environment.

This insect can help us understand the afterlife and the significance of the resurrected Jesus, Paul, on his iourneys, discovered that some members of the church in Corinth were confused about life after death. So. Paul. wrote a lengthy letter to them to explain the importance of the resurrection of Jesus, and how it affects our future existence Paul doesn't mention caterpillars and butterflies but describes a seed becoming a plant. By just looking at an individual seed there is no knowing what it is going to look like! But out of its death comes a beautiful new life form

Paul points out that all living beings have a body that enables them to live in a particular environment. There are earthly bodies for living in a physical world and a spiritual body for living in the heavenly realms. And so, God will give to us a new spiritual body to enable us to live with Him in heaven.

Of course, all butterflies eventually die, but in our resurrected body we will not be subject to decay or death. How do we know this? Jesus said:

"Because I live, you also will live" (John 14:19).

Jesus pioneered the way for us. He died on the cross, arose from the

grave, and so opened up the way for all believers in Him to go to Heaven. Thanks be to God!

Climate Sunday

Sunday **5th September** is being designated Climate Sunday, ahead of the UN's climate change conference, COP26, in Glasgow during November. How should we approach the challenge of climate change? We have damaged God's creation: God delights in His creation:

'God saw all that He had made, and it was very good.' (Genesis 1:31).

However, we have damaged this world and impacted people, created in His image. The burning of oil or gas and cutting down forests is increasing the concentration of greenhouse gases like carbon dioxide that trap heat in the Earth's atmosphere. The global average temperature could increase by 1.5°C in 2030, resulting in significant damage to our planet. Already, increasing temperatures are melting ice caps, raising sea-levels, changing rainfall patterns and creating extreme climate events. It's the 70% of the world's poorest population who are being impacted most. Hope is found in Jesus: He has an intimate knowledge of the workings of creation.

'For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together.' (Colossians 1:16,17).

Our hope for the future lies in what Jesus has done and continues to do in the world. He is the one who sustains creation and will bring everything to completion. An invitation to respond; Simple everyday actions can help to sustain our planet, including recycling of waste, energy saving and changes in our lifestyle and diet to help the planet. We can fix our eves on Jesus, as we pray for our world for our world leaders, gathering in Glasgow, asking that they may reach a good agreement for the future of our world

Holy Cross Day 14th September

On Holy Cross Day the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it. Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, and seek out the places of special significance to Christians.

Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans

around 135 AD. But even so. Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. That church, built in honour of the Cross. was dedicated on 14 September 335. The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his De Corona (3:2) around AD 211. noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are His. A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say: "Draw an I." That is you standing before the Lord, saying, 'Here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke - as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my self-will and make you the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to your love and service."

On Holy Cross Day, we recall Jesus' wonderful promise

"And when I am lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)

Faithful to Scripture Faithful to Science

Alister McGrath is well-known as a theologian, but he started out as a scientist. After becoming a Christian as a student, he wanted to learn about his new faith so he studied theology at the same time as completing his PhD in molecular biophysics. He has not lost touch with science, but has continued to write and speak about how science and Christian faith work together. In this extract from a recently released interview, he shares his experience of being a scientist and a Christian.

"I think my most vivid experience of wonder took place in the 1970's when I was on vacation in Iran. We were travelling on a bus in the middle of the night because it wasn't hot then, and the bus broke down. We found ourselves in the middle of this solemn black desert, and the night sky shone with a brilliance like I had never seen before. That just overwhelmed me, it made me think there is something really wonderful here.

"Now, I was a Christian by that time and I knew how Christianity could answer that but it just struck me, that sense of wonder has two possible outcomes. One is science this universe is wonderful, what's it all about? But of course, it is also about religion, the deeper levels of things that science can't really engage. I think one of the things I have discovered over time is that maybe this sense of wonder both opens the gateway to science and to faith, and that those two together are able to answer questions which on their own they simply couldn't.

"I think science is wonderful at asking questions. Some of those questions can be answered, but very often when you do answer them, they simply open up yet more questions. But of course, there are some more fundamental questions I think science simply cannot answer - they transcend its capacities to answer, and you might think of nonempirical questions like, 'Why am I here? What is the meaning of life? What is good and how do I live a good life?'

"These are real questions and they're good questions but they're not scientific questions. And the psychologists tell us that we really need answers to those questions if we are to lead a fulfilled human existence. You find some scientists who say, 'Well because science can't answer them there are no answers to be given', but actually most realise that there are answers waiting to be discovered - it's just that science can't deliver them. "Science fills in part of a big picture but there are parts of the picture you have to fill in from somewhere else. Science is part of the answer but only part, and faith supplements it, giving us a vision of life that is exciting and reliable, and also something that we can inhabit meaningfully."
